ESD, E-CIGS, & VAPES

Electronic Smoking Devices (ESDs) are designed to work like an actual cigarette, allowing the user to inhale the vapor from the nicotine-laced liquid flavor. E-cigarettes, vapes, and ESDs are types of Electronic Nicotine Delivery Systems (ENDS).

HOW DOES IT WORK?

ESDS CONTAIN A BATTERY THAT ACTIVATES A HEATING DEVICE, ATOMIZING LIQUID NICOTINE INSIDE A CARTRIDGE AND PRODUCING A VAPOR, WHICH THE USER INHALES. 30% OF ESD USERS BEGIN SMOKING CIGARETTES WITHIN 6 MONTHS OF FIRST USING AN ESD. YOUTH WHO BEGIN USING AN ESD ARE 3 TO 4 TIMES MORE LIKELY THAN THEIR PEERS TO USE TRADITIONAL CIGARETTES, AND OTHER DRUGS, IN THE FUTURE.
