Stick to Routine.

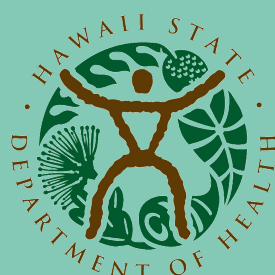
School might have been shut down so it's up to you to keep your kid's day structured. Create and stick to schedules for mealtime, study and play.
